

Here are some this month's staff picks and new bestsellers available through the Southeast Regional Library and the Estevan Public Library




Dark Night of the Mountain Man by William Johnstone

Then a bartender in the heart of town is found clawed to a bloody pulp. Now every man in Big Rock is taking up arms to hunt down the beast before it strikes again—which worries the local sheriff.




The Engagement Party: A novel by Darby Kane

Inheritance by Nora Roberts




Jazz Club Spy: A novel by Roberta Rich


Let Us Descend by Jesmyn Ward


The Roaring Days of Zora Lily by Noelle Salazar
